Chair's Report

Message from the Chair - Amelia Salmon

Dear members and friends,

It has been a busy and exciting year for QSEC and the growing role of social innovation in Qld.

Our membership has steadily grown over the year with a number of wonderful and exciting enterprises coming on board.

Our work continues to cover four main areas:

- 1. **Advocacy** Working with Government and the corporate sector to create a more enabling environment for Social Enterprise.
- 2. **Networking** Creating opportunities for social enterprise leaders and employees to meet and network and provide mutual support.
- 3. **Marketing** continuing to open up markets via social procurement and promote choosing social enterprise to the broader community.
- 4. **Capacity Building** Assisting to build capacity through our workshops and events series and programs such as partnering with School for Social Entrepreneurs in Cairns this year.

The outcomes of the Mental Health Commission's report (search "Employing people with mental health conditions" at <u>socialoutcomes.com.au</u>) gave greater formal recognition of the capacity for social enterprise to solve unemployment for some of our most vulnerable people last year. Social Enterprise is now firmly on the State Government Agenda and we are working closely with State Government at a number of levels.

Central QLD - Things have continued to move quickly for QSEC with myself attending the *Better Together* – *Partnering for Social Impact and Innovation Conference* in Yeppoon where I ran a workshop to introduce what's involved in a social enterprise start up and sat on the panel exploring 'social investment'. It was a great conference. Wonderful to meet so many people interested in pursuing 'social enterprise' as a strategy to develop more sustainable employment options for their clients and communities. We will continue to engage with the crew in central Qld to support the budding social enterprises in the region.

North QLD - Our work to open up markets and increase social procurement opportunities also continued with a social procurement Market Day held in Cairns to bring procurement officers and social enterprises together.

We furthered this work by partnering the School for Social Entrepreneurs to run an Accelerator program with social innovators in North Queensland.

It's been a pleasure working with our wonderful and committed Board members. Richard Warner continues to go above and beyond as Secretary. Huge thank you to our two Vice Chairs Marc Sims and Robert Hannaford for their constant advocacy work on behalf of the sector. Many thanks to Grant Williams and James Boreham for keeping our systems and finances in working order. It's a much needed role! Thank you to all of our Board members Tony Sharp, Saba Abraham, Jennifer Bishop, Rod Hyatt, and Pacific Gakindi.

Eyes on Social Procurement and Regional development



North QLD Social Procurement Forum and Market Day (10 March)

"Make a connection, make a difference"

QSEC joined with the Cairns Chamber of Commerce and the Queensland Department of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Affairs in bringing this flagship event to North Queensland, laying the ground for a far-reaching social procurement environment in Queensland.

The event attracted more than 130 delegates from local and state government and industry, as well as representatives from more than 40 social and disability enterprises, and Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander businesses in the Northern Queensland region.

Building on the success of the Social Procurement Forum and Market Day held in Brisbane on 4 August 2015, people in and around social enterprise and the community sector came together including government, industry, not-for-profits and social enterprises - to discuss how to leverage the Government's billions of procurement dollars for social benefit.

Through this event, QSEC and its partners aimed to enable the Northern Queensland region to benefit from better social procurement outcomes. This includes increasing awareness and opportunities for local companies, Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander businesses, social enterprises and Australian disability enterprises to do business with government.

SSE & QSEC: Far North Queensland Accelerator Program

Over August and September, in partnership with QSEC, the School for Social Entrepreneurs invited upcoming social innovators for their Accelerator program, taking ideas and energy for local enterprise toward a sound and sustainable future as a social venture.

Graduation for the fantastic class of pitchers was held on October 7, celebrating the growth of their projects, and the strength of the positive changemakers they represent in communities farther afield.





QSEC at Logan City Council Social Enterprise Expo (2 November)




The 2016 Logan Social Enterprise Expo was hosted by the Independent Social Enterprise Network - Logan, a support, advocacy and knowledge sharing organisation for Logan-based social enterprises and not-for-profit organisations.

QSEC participated in this free event featuring a series of guest speakers experienced in developing social enterprises.

The event was officially opened by Queensland Government Minister, The Honourable Leeanne Enoch (Minister for Innovation, Science and the Digital Economy and Minister for Small Business), and Cameron Burgess will be the opening guest speaker.

Inspiration for Small Towns: Economic Development (5 November)

QSEC Chair Amelia Salmon spoke at this two-day conference, joining keynote speakers from other areas of regional development in Australia, who gave presentations on their economic development journeys – the good, the bad and the ugly. The conference was a fantastic opportunity to learn from the experiences of organisations in and close to social enterprise.



Each individual and each community which engaged with this "ideas fest for regional economic development" had their own creative responses to the stories and experiences shared. This was an opportunity for all those interested in economic development futures on the Southern Downs and beyond to be on the same page going forward, and will help us all to prioritise development initiatives for the future.

Latest Intelligence on Social Enterprise in Aus & the USA (14 June)



The Latest Intelligence on Social Enterprise on June 14th was an excellent briefing on the sector nationally and overseas. QSEC was glad to be a part of bringing the expertise of Social Traders and REDF to everyone who came along.

QSEC in partnership with Social Traders invited everyone to a briefing on social enterprise with David Brookes, Managing Director of Social Traders and Carla Javits, President & CEO of REDF (USA).

David and Carla shared recent findings on the state of social enterprise in Australia and the USA, providing direction for the creation of appropriate resources, tools and policy settings to continue to grow the social enterprise sector.

Following up on the event, Social Traders have released Finding Australia's Social Enterprise Sector 2016, presenting research by the Centre for Social Impact (CSI) Swinburne in partnership with Social Traders. The research provides a great outline of the major changes in the sector over the past six years and the main opportunities and barriers for social enterprise growth and development into the future. Brisbane City Council taking action

Award for Buy Social

Brisbane City Council joined the winners of Social Trader's Social Enterprise Award 2016, taking home the award for Buy Social, having "made a strong commitment to social procurement over the past decade, delivering local services including cleaning, catering, animal welfare services and more from a growing list of social enterprises."

This win is good news for social enterprise across Queensland, with the biggest local government area spending \$4 million in social procurement over the past financial year alone.

Highlighting an emerging interest in social procurement, Lord Mayor Graham Quirk has indicated the Council's Value For Money methodology, saying "...50 percent of the tender assessment is attributable to non-price measures. If a social enterprise can demonstrate capability and capacity, Council will often look beyond price."

Understanding the sector - Survey with KPMG

With the assistance of QSEC's channels, Brisbane City Council sought this year to define and measure the social enterprise market of Brisbane and its contribution to the economy. Brisbane City Council recognises the importance of this sector and was keen to hear directly from organisations operating in this market. As part of this scoping project, BCC engaged KPMG assist in conducting a survey of social enterprises operating in Brisbane.

Questions revolved around: what is currently happening in the social enterprise market on the ground, the key challenges for enterprises, and the opportunities that exist, as well as gain a better understanding of the ecosystem more broadly.

The participation of social enterprises operating in Brisbane was critical to the success of the study, and the responses will provide valuable insights for Council into the social enterprise market.

The Business Model Canvas is used to grow concepts to workable stage, from formulation and strategy through to communication.

Robyn Cook, Kitchen Garden Teacher, has trained and supported well over 600 Principals, teachers and parents to create gardens and kitchens in schools, deal with pests and diseases, encourage community support, volunteers and build financial resilience. Schools successfully engage their students in garden and kitchen classes that are curriculum relevant, lifeskill building, nourishing and nurturing

Cookery Nook is a not for profit social enterprise supporting Mercy Community Services (MCS) Disability Services. All Cookery Nook profits go towards MCS Disability Services to assist them in providing support to people with intellectual disabilities. Their aim is to develop an ecosystem of social ventures which will provide employment opportunities, vocational training and community participation to those who need it most.




On the road at CRN National Forum
